


A note on the loss of DORIAN

"This boat was a true force of nature. She was loved by many, loved many, and I truly believe she held out just as long as she could to get her crew to safety on this day." -D. Morano

On Saturday September 21st, during the annual Cross Sound Challenge, Chris Morano's classic Pearson 39 Yawl Dorian began taking on water as they approached a mark of the race course north of Plum Island (Chris will remind you he was leading the race at the time!). After a complete and thorough inspection, her expert crew of engineers and top level racers could not locate the source of water intrusion, and considering the extreme rate of ingress, they immediately went into may-day protocols and began preparing to abandon ship. While the Coast Guard was quick to respond, they were too far away and the crew instead switched radio frequencies to alert their nearby competitors. Within minutes, several boats were on the scene, including Gumdrop (NCYC), Madaket (NCYC), Fusion (DIYC), and Past Commodore Tim Brewer aboard Fathom. In extremely challenging conditions, with rough seas and winds gusting into the high 30s, all 6 of Dorian's crew were rescued onto Gumdrop and Fathom, with only moments to spare before Dorian sank. The



entire frightening episode, from the time of the mayday call to the time Dorian went down, was estimated to be less than 15 minutes. The loss of Dorian was a truly traumatic experience for those involved, but a human tragedy was avoided due to the heroic efforts of Fathom & Gumdrop, along with the admirable seamanship displayed by Dorian's crew, who displayed real courage under fire.

The ECYC Board salutes those who came to Dorian's aid, and our hearts go out to the Morano family. In time and in collaboration with those involved, we'll honor them in the hopes that others can learn from the experience, and that Dorian's ECYC legacy is preserved.

For now, there is talk of a potential "Safety at Sea" seminar early next year, where our team will discuss lessons learned. Stay tuned for more details on that. As I write this safety note for 8 Bells, all of Connecticut's TV news bureaus are reporting on the boat explosion and fire in Old Saybrook. Multiple media outlets indicate that the event occurred when the vessel was refueling pier-side. This tragic event offers an opportunity to review some safety issues regarding fuel systems, as many of you start to pull your boats out of the water or ready them for winter if they remain in the water.

Refueling a vessel is a very routine function. However, it can be exceptionally dangerous. This is one evolution where the vessel's operator needs to be 100% distraction-free. To help facilitate this, the operator should ask any other passengers to depart the boat and move away from the area, leaving only the operator and the attendant. Let's review some obvious items regarding refueling safety upfront.

First, when was the last time you had your fuel system inspected? Seriously. A complete stem-to-stern inspection? This includes everything from the piping and motors to the tanks themselves. Do they show signs of wear and tear? Ensuring that the fuel transfer and holding system is fully maintained is imperative. Along the same line... are your ventilation fans fully operational? As several boating sites note: "When you need to refuel your boat, when should you turn on the power ventilation system? The power ventilation system should be turned on before beginning the refueling process. This will help to prevent any fumes from building up in the boat's compartment." Second, how familiar are you with static sparks? The presence of this type of discharge can cause fuel to ignite. To address this, I recommend a few steps. Start by ensuring you have a grounding wire attached. Consider, just during refueling, not wearing shoes with rubber soles. Why? Because these types of soles create static. Next, you should ensure that you maintain contact between the hose nozzle and filler neck to prevent static sparks. Further, the American Boating Association adds that "when fueling is complete, securely fasten the gas cap, then open up all windows and doors to ventilate" Walk around the boat and do a "sniff" test for leaks.

Third, do everything you can to avoid spilling even a drop of fuel into the water. Ensure that you don't overfill your tanks. Listen to the sound as you start the refueling process. What you hear is different as the tank reaches near completion. Additionally, watching the onboard gauge can be another easy way to maintain situational awareness. Finally, always have an absorbent pad handy to wipe any drops off as you remove the nozzle.

The fourth and last issue regarding fuel and fuel systems is the ongoing debate about filling a tank before winter storage. Boats.net states: "when a boat's engine is left idle during storage, the ethanol keeps absorbing water until it reaches saturation, at which point the fuel undergoes what's called 'phase separation.' When phase separation occurs, the water/ethanol mix within the fuel settles on the bottom of the fuel tank. This layer of water/ethanol will corrode a metal fuel tank, and can get sucked into the fuel system when the motor is next run, which then requires injectors or carburetors to be drained and cleaned." You can find the whole article on whether you should fill a fuel tank before winter storage at Boats.net.

Refueling is routine....but extra care needs to be taken to ensure it remains that way.
